## RABBI'S MESSAGE

### SHALOM AND BLESSINGS OF PEACE

**Balancing Stoicism and Meaning**

A recent social media post caught my attention, stating that in three or four generations, nobody will remember us, so why care about who likes us and who doesn't. This sentiment resonates deeply with Stoic philosophy, which emphasizes impermanence and the need to focus on what truly matters. Stoicism encourages individuals to prioritize their inner strength, wisdom, and resilience over external validation. It also advises us to stop obsessing over the things we cannot change.

This perspective is both liberating and humbling. It's liberating because it frees us from petty concerns that consume our precious time, and humbling because it teaches us to accept the things we cannot change including the ephemeral nature of our lives. We are but a fleeting moment in the vast expanse of time, a shooting star blazing briefly before fizzling out into the darkness.

Even though I adopt a lot of these thoughts in my daily life, stoicism alone feels incomplete for me. While Stoicism provides a valuable framework for navigating life's major challenges, it doesn't fully address the significance of our individual lives, our purpose and unique destiny. I do not believe existence is a "freak accident" and therefore I believe my thoughts, feelings and concerns are significant for my destiny. Each person comes into the world with unique potential, talents, and abilities. This perspective is found in Torah: Midrash Tanchuma (Vayetze 4): "Every person has a specific mission in life, and if they fulfill it, they are considered as if they have fulfilled the entire Torah." Midrash Tehillim (Psalms 103:4): "G-d gives each person a unique gift, and it is up to them to develop and use it."

We encounter challenges that force us to grow and overcome, and our paths are shaped by our individual experiences. Unlike the detached stoic view, our purpose is not defined solely by external recognition or remembrance, but by the fulfillment of our potential. The Stoic approach appears to measure one's life value in the context of societal recognition, and for me this, falls short. Instead, I propose that our lives have meaning when we fulfill our potential. Our talents and abilities are, in essence, G-d's commandments. And when we practice our calling, we fulfill our purpose before G-d and humanity.

In conclusion, while Stoicism offers broad insight into the fleeting nature of human existence, and persuades us to think bigger thoughts, meaning based philosophies provide essential understanding of one's personal destiny. By focusing on our relationships, serving others, and fulfilling G-d's commandments, we discover the essence of our being. That is when we find joy and give joy to others. That is when we live a meaningful life undeterred by the fact we will be forgotten in two hundred years. Meaning needs no remembrance, it has intrinsic value and lives forever in every soul.



# SCHMOOZE A LITTLE, EAT A LITTLE, LEARN ALOT

On April 26, 2025, Lee Smulen did a presentation entitled" Jews in Baseball." He shared with us some information about the challenges that faced some of these players and he talked about their stories.

There have been some players who identified themselves as Jewish, including those who converted, who have had at least one Jewish parent, or simply identified as one by virtue of their parentage.

Lip Pike was the first Jewish Major League Baseball player and one of the first players in history. Cal Adams, one of the "Boys of Summer" players became famous for playing for the Brooklyn Dodgers during the 40's and 50's. Harry "The Horse" Danning, played for the New York Giants in the 30's and 40's. Other players include Sid Gordon, an All-Star, five-two outfielder for the Giants, Larry Sherry, relief pitcher and 1959 World Series MVP for the L.A. Dodgers, and others.

This project enlightens the audience about the richness that the Jewish players brought to the game of baseball.

On May 16th, Paloma, Kelvin and their sons gave us a history and cultural lesson about the Dominican Republic. They concentrated on "Being Jewish in the Dominican Republic."

Jews arrived in that country after their expulsion from Spain in 1492. They practiced their faith in secret because of their negative experience. However, they explained that the organized and visible Jewish community was formed there in the 20th century.

The most important moment for Jews occurred in the 1930's and 1940's, when the dictator, Rafael Leonidas Trujillo, offered them refuge. He was one of the few leaders who agreed to accept them.

The Jews settled mainly in Sosua, in the northern coast od the D.R. They government gave them land and they worked in agriculture.

Today, there is a synagogue and a Jewish museum in Sosua/ Although small in numbers, they are active and proud to be Jews.
